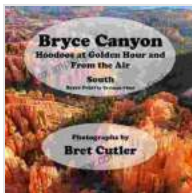


# Hoodoo Rock Formations of Bryce Canyon National Park

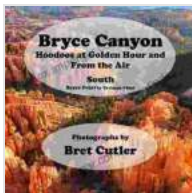

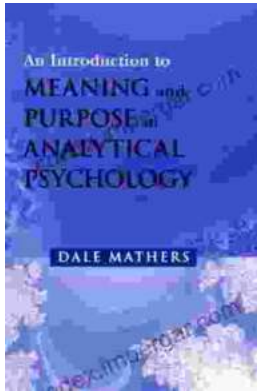

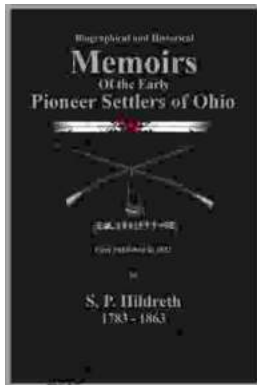
